GREEK COUNCILS & ORGANIZATIONS AT THE UNIVERISTY OF HOUSTON

Houston Panhellenic Council (HPC)

Panhellenic is the governing body for 6 of the 26 national/international sororities that belong to the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC). Panhellenic sponsors coordinate Primary Recruitment each fall semester. Panhellenic women at UH have higher average GPAs than the all-women's average at UH. Our mission as an organization is guided by our Panhellenic creed, as well as our four purposes: we are leaders, we are students, we are philanthropists, and we are sisters.

Interfraternity Council (IFC)

The Interfraternity Council at the University of Houston is a self-governing organization of 11 North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) and historically-NIC fraternities that promote chapter collaboration and unified fraternal action. With some of the most prestigious national organizations in the University of Houston Greek community, IFC strives to build a stronger community by providing leadership, educational, and intramural opportunities for all of its chapter members.

Multicultural Greek Council (MGC)

Founded on the University of Houston campus in 2003, MGC governs 11 culturally-oriented and faith-based fraternities and sororities. MGC sponsors community service projects and leadership development for its member organizations, in addition to creating policies that govern each of the participating chapters.

National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC)

The National Pan-Hellenic Council is the governing body for the "Divine Nine" historically African-American fraternities and sororities. NPHC aims to unify the eight member organizations represented on the UH campus through an emphasis on community service, academics, leadership development, and collaboration.

United Greek Council (UGC)

The United Greek Council (UGC) is the governing body for special interest and cultural/identity-based fraternities and sororities that seek to promote diversity, unity, and cohesion while highlighting their uniqueness and added value to the University of Houston campus. 

VALUES-BASED RECRUITMENT

We operate under the ideology of values-based recruitment in our Panhellenic community. We encourage conversations between members and potential new members to focus on organizational values, benefits, and the obligations of sorority membership.

The primary recruitment process consists of three structured rounds designed to show you what each sorority has to offer. You will have the chance to meet current sorority women in each chapter, so take the time to get to know them and ask questions about activities, financial obligations, scholarships, and campus life.





Potential new members and chapter members should get to know each other well enough to take the first step toward and important life choice. We encourage you to consider which chapters have values that align with your own and what values you hope to strengthen during your time in college as you move through the recruitment process.

MUTUAL SELECTION STATEMENT



Primary Recruitment follows a mutual selection process. After each round (Sisterhood, Philanthropy, & Preference), you will rank the chapters you visited. Take detailed notes about your feelings and conversations to help decide which chapters best fit your values and interests.

You'll receive a schedule of chapters to attend the next day from your recruitment counselors. You must attend every party on your schedule unless extenuating circumstances arise.

Sororities also limit the number of women they invite back, so you might not be selected for the next round. This doesn't mean the chapter didn't enjoy meeting you. Keep an open mind, as you may find your home in an unexpected chapter.

After the Preference round, you'll rank up to your top two sororities. Your preferences will then be compared with the sororities' preferences.

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER BILL OF RIGHTS

- The right to be treated as an individual.
- The right to be fully informed about the recruitment process.
- The right to ask questions and receive true and objective answers from recruitment counselors and members.
- The right to be treated as a capable and mature person without being patronized.
- The right to ask how and why and receive straight answers.
- The right to have and express opinions to the recruitment counselors.
- The right to have inviolable confidentiality when sharing information with recruitment counselors.
- The right to make informed choices without undue pressure from others.
- The right to be fully informed about the binding agreements implicit in the preference card signing.
- The right to make one's own choice and decision and accept full responsibility for the results of that decision.
- The right to have a positive, safe, and enriching recruitment and new member period.
- The right to not be persuaded by a sorority member to resign her bid to any sorority during her new member period.

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER CODE OF ETHICS

- A potential new member (PNM) shall attend recruitment orientation and all membership recruitment events for which she receives invitations.
- Respect for the membership recruitment process is expected at all times. This
 includes respect toward chapter members, recruitment counselors, Panhellenic
 officers, faculty and staff, chapter members and other potential new members.
 PNMs should refrain from sexist, homophobic, racist or otherwise abhorrent
 conversations.
- I understand my rights under the PNM Bill of Rights and if I experience discrimination I know how to report it to the College Panhellenic Vice President of Recruitment.
- Potential new members as well as sorority members must do their best to not touch or shake hands in any way. This helps prevent the spread of illness.
- Membership recruitment is a substance-free process. Women may not use or be under the influence of drugs or alcohol during recruitment events.
- Potential new members should be fully aware of the financial obligations of membership before accepting a bid. It is to the PNM's advantage to ask questions during recruitment events if there are questions about finances.
- Potential new members agree to treat the chapter videos and recruitment parties as confidential.
- Potential new members will not share any video of recruitment events, including a video in its entirety, or recordings, clips, screen shots, and/or quotes from video or recruitment events. Potential new members understand that any breach of this agreement could result in disciplinary action.
- Potential new members understand that if they sign a Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA) after preference round, they are bound to that document and the chapter that extends them a bid. This means that the PNM is ineligible for an invitation to membership from another NPC organization until the next primary recruitment on that campus.

 - Don't feel pressured to join a particular chapter because a friend, sibling, or parent. Make this experience your own!




Keep notes on your conversations, thoughts, and feelings throughout the weekend. This will help you make the best decision and will also be great to look back at, a year from now.

FINANCIAL TRANSPARENCY

As a member of a Panhellenic organization you will be required to pay dues. These dues, which are local and national, help Greek organizations run the way that they do.

As a council, we strive in educating all potential new members in the financial requirements and commitments of each chapter at the University of Houston.



FAQsHow much are dues?

During your new member semester, dues will range from \$870-\$1300, depending on the organization. Once you become an initiated/active member, your dues will decrease, ranging from \$670-\$830.

Do I have to pay the total amount at one time?

Many of our chapters allow new and active members to separate dues into multiple payments. Each chapter has a finance officer to help you if needed, but it is important to as those questions prior to accepting a bid.

What do my dues pay for?

National dues contribute to organization support programs, historical preservation, and much more. Local or chapter dues help your chapter host programming & social events, provide supplies for the chapter hours, t-shirts and more!

Please be aware that although your chapter dues cover a lot of different costs, there may be additional costs that arise every now and then!

WHAT ARE RECRUITMENT COUNSELORS?

The recruitment process is often filled with many emotions. After registering for Primary Recruitment, you will be put into a group with other potential members as well as leaders and mentors, Recruitment Counselors (RCs), who will guide you through the recruitment process. Recruitment Counselors are members of the Panhellenic community that have completed at least 1 academic year as a sorority member. RCs are familiar with both sides of the recruitment process and are trained to answer any questions you may have as well as give you unbiased advice and relieve any pressures you may be feeling.





Your RC is a resource for you, but more importantly she is an impartial listener. You should be able to lean on your RC before, during, and after the recruitment process. Ask her any questions you may have, share your joys, and share your worries.

Orientation is the most casual events of the recruitment process, as you will not be meeting any chapters or chapter members. We encourage women to wear whatever they feel most comfortable and confident in.



During the primary recruitment process, sisterhood round is of the more casual. HPC will provide all registered potential new members with a shirt to wear during Sisterhood Days 1 & 2. Women are encouraged pair the shirt with bottoms and accessories that make them feel most comfortable and confident in.

Philanthropy Round:

Philanthropy round is more formal than sisterhood round but not as formal as Preference round.

Often we encourage women to wear sundresses, business casual, or rompers; however, it is most important to wear what you feel elevated, comfortable, and confident in.

Preference Round:

Preference round is the most formal and intimate. Women are encouraged to dress in formal attire that allows them to feel elegant, comfortable and

confident.

Bid Day:

Bid Day is the most exciting! Women are encouraged to wear neutral, comfortable clothing & shoes. Women will receive a shirt to change into after opening bids!

Should you have any questions about attire or need outfit inspiration for each round, be sure to reach out to your recruitment counselor!

MEMBER RECRUITMENT ACCEPTANCE BINDING AGREEMENT (MRABA)



Please carefully read and understand the following points before you sign your Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA)

• You have the following options when considering your agreement:

1. You may choose to not complete the agreement at this time.

2. You may choose to list and rank the women's fraternity/sorority whose preference events you attended and from which you are willing to accept

an invitation to membership (a bid).

3. You may choose to limit your choices to just one or list any women's fraternity/sorority whose preference round you attended and from which you are willing to accept an invitation to membership (a bid). Please understand that by not listing the maximum number of events you attended, you may be limiting your potential to join any other NPC organization should you not be placed with your choice.

- When you sign this agreement you are agreeing to accept an invitation to membership from any NPC fraternity/sorority that you have listed before.
- Once the acceptance agreement has been turned in to the representative of the NPC, it cannot be altered or changed at any point.
- If you receive an invitation to membership (a bid) from any NPC organization that you listed and you decided not to accept it, you will be ineligible to be pledged by any other NPC fraternity/sorority on campus until the beginning of the next primary recruitment period.
- If you do not receive an invitation to membership (a bid) from any NPC organization that you have listed, you will be eligible for continuous open bidding if/when space allows. You must understand that not all NPC organizations will have available spaces for new members for the academic year.

LIFE AS A FIRST YEAR SORORITY WOMEN

As a new member, there are certain expectations and requirements that all women must meet. Provisional membership timelines vary between each chapter and will be a time of learning, growth, and sisterhood.

During this time you will learn the history, present, and future of the sorority, the expectations of active membership, and the responsibilities of a Panhellenic woman. You will get the first glimpses into a lifetime of friendship and sisterhood. It is important to absorb everything and all of your experiences.

NEW MEMBER MEETINGS:

New members will be required to attend weekly meetings. During these meetings, the sorority's new member educator will offer guidance and help you reflect on your decision to join a Greek organization.

NEW MEMBER RETREAT:

During the provisional membership period, you will be able to attend a retreat that is only for your member class. This retreat will help you to build a bond and grow with the women around you.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS:

As a new member, your dues and fees will be higher than those of active members. Many chapters have a one time national and local fee that members must pay upon gaining membership to that organization.

BIG/LITTLE SISTER PROGRAM:

As a new member, you will be matched with an older member. This member will serve as your mentor and guide through your time in the sorority.

INITIATION:

At the end of your provisional membership, you will participate in a ritual ceremony that, upon completion, will grant you lifetime membership into the organization.

The Houston Panhellenic Council strives to make every year of sorority life a great one; however, we recognize that the first year can be the most exciting and influential of them all. It is important to remember that the provisional membership experience may vary slightly between organizations, but you will enter a new circle of friends and are not only expected to treat everyone with respect but be treated with respect.

Here at the University of Houston, sororities do not condone or participate in any actives which can be classified as hazing.



GREEK DICTONARY

Active: a sorority member currently in college who has be formally initiated by her chapter.

Alumna: an initiated sorority member who is no longer active in a collegiate chapter.

Badge: a unique insignia of fraternity of sorority membership worn by initiated members.

Bid: a formal invitation to join a fraternity or sorority.

Bid Day: the last day of recruitment when PNMs receive bids to join chapters a become new members.

Chapter: local member group of a national organization.

Continuous Open Bidding

(COB): a period where a sorority, not at campus total, is able to recruit members. The COB process is less formal and not all chapters may participate.

Houston Panhellenic Council (HPC): the governing body of the 6 National Panhellenic Conference sororities at the University of Houston.

Houston Panhellenic Executive Board: the 8 undergraduate women that lead the Houston Panhellenic Council.

Initiation: a formal ceremony that brings new members into full membership of a fraternity or sorority.

Legacy: a PNM whose parent, sibling, or grandparents is an active or alumni member of the organization.

Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA): a

document that each PNM completes immediately following selections after Preference round. This is the agreement that states the PNM is willing to accept a bid from any sorority she has listed.

National Panhellenic Conference (NPC): founded in 1902, NPC provides support and guidance for its 26 member inter/national sororities and serves as the national voice on contemporary issues of sorority life. NPC serves as the umbrella organization for HPC.

New Member: a student who has accepted a bid for membership. After a period of education regarding the fraternity or sorority, ranging from about 6-8 week, the student is initiated to become a full member.

New Member

Educator/Director: a chapter member who has been elected to lead the new member education process and prepare new members for initiation.

GREEK DICTONARY

Philanthropy: a national and/or local charity that a sorority sponsors, donating time and money through service.

Potential New Member

(PNM): any woman who is eligible to participate in the primary recruitment process.

Recruitment: a designated membership recruitment period during which a series of organized events are held for the purpose of selecting new members.

Recruitment Counselor (RC): a

sorority member who does not participate in primary recruitment with her chapter, but works with HPC to assist PNMs through the process.

Round: a particular day of recruitment. There are four rounds during primary recruitment: Sisterhood Round 1, Sisterhood Round 2, Philanthropy Round, and Preference Round. Events that make up the rounds are called parties Total: the allowable chapter size as determined by NPC's Total Method Setting Team.

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
